## **BLUE PLAQUE UNVEILING**

On Tuesday 14<sup>th</sup> November 2023, a blue plaque was unveiled on the church site to commemorate the 1<sup>st</sup> Ipswich Company's 115 years of service to Boys Brigade in the church here in Tacket Street. The ceremony was led by Ron Baker with Graham Still, member of TSBBOB Association and Neil, who read the prayers and blessing. Several members of Christ Church attended together with 25 Old Boys.

It was the vision of our Founder-Captain R.H.Paul (Harry) to seek to start a BB Company in 1903, some 20 years after the BB started in Glasgow in 1883. BB was becoming popular nationally at the time, and often started from a church Sunday school, as was the case at Tacket Street Congregational Church.

Many great men and women have ensured that the Company continued in strength over those years with over 2,000 members serving in the Company. Some finished their service and moved on, with others staying to offer continuity, by becoming Officers, Leaders and church members, taking on various posts in the church.



Over the 115 years and continuing with the Old Boys Association, former members have remained faithful and loyal to the service they gave, recognising the impact it has made on their lives. Closure in 2018 was unfortunately inevitable at the time, but with a strong bond, the Old Boys Association has let us 'keep the memory alive'.

We started with an inspiring talk by Marian and Chris Stephens about bee-keeping and bee-encouraging. John Day is the owner of the East Anglian Traditional Art Centre and spoke very knowledgeably about Suffolk and Norfolk artists. He was followed by John Hammond who has volunteered at the St Elizabeth Hospice Shop in Martlesham since it opened. He too has become knowledgeable in his field and can tell what is valuable, and where and how to sell it to get the best price for the Hospice. He also spoke movingly about the work of the hospice itself. Councillor Carole Jones explained the need for, and the running of, food banks and pop-up shops locally. The month will finish with music – David Stainer and Diz Deacon will entertain us with their own brand of folk music.

There are only two weeks in December for Forum. The first week we will hear from Alan Cutting, who works via 'Together for Ipswich' (we heard about the setting up of this from Archdeacon Rhiannon King a couple of years ago). He'll tell us about the care for Ukraine refugees in Ipswich. We finish with our celebration of carols and readings, which is fast becoming a tradition.

The programme in January starts off with a 'high profile' name: Tim Passmore, the Suffolk Police and Crime Commissioner, on 11<sup>th</sup> January. The first foray out of East Anglia for a while comes on 18<sup>th</sup> January when we are transported to Ireland by our photographer friend Ian Van der Ende. The Suffolk Wildlife Trust is going to tell us about their (our) newest reserve, the Martlesham Wilds, having reached their goal of fundraising but now needing to furnish and care for the area. The first Thursday of February will still be local, but not a story of picturesque rural Suffolk. We'll get an update from Ipswich Town Pastor Paul Laughlin.

All these delights are preceded by the same quality meals as ever. Our five pairs of caterers work so reliably and so expertly, we can easily take them for granted, but we are very grateful to Janet and Siobhan, Netty and Trish, Anne and Nellie, Kate and John, and Stephen and Kiki, our most recently-recruited cooks.

Come once; come just for food; come just for the presentation; make it a habit. Whichever suits you best.

# **ECO GROUP CREATION CARE**

A Rocha UK <u>arocha.org.uk</u> is a Christian charity working for the protection and restoration of the natural world, and committed to mobilising Christians and churches in the UK to care for the environment.

On 20 September, Prime Minister Rishi Sunak announced radical changes to a raft of environmental policies in what he called a "pragmatic, proportionate and realistic" approach to net zero by 2050. In the last few weeks, the Climate Change Committee (CCC), the government's own advisors on climate, have offered a blistering rebuttal. Far from 'realistic', the CCC have warned that these policy reversals have damaged the UK's ability to meet our climate commitments and will keep energy bills high for millions of households.

The announcements included delaying the ban on the sale of new petrol and diesel vehicles from 2030 to 2035, delaying the ban on installing oil and LPG boilers and new coal heating, in off-grid homes to 2035 rather than phasing them out from 2026, an exemption to the phase out of fossil fuel for the approximately one-fifth of UK homes who would struggle the most to switch to green alternatives, and scrapping of policies which would force landlords to upgrade the energy efficiency of their properties. The prime minister defended these moves, saying that he is still committed to net zero commitments and trying to "bring the country along with us" and save families thousands by delaying the green pledges.

Yet he has faced considerable criticism across business, politics (including several ex-Conservative PMs), and civil society, who have pointed out that this is a false economy which will not only cost more in the long run, but also put another nail in the coffin of the UK's international climate leadership. Lisa Brankin, Chair of Ford UK, said that the delay on petrol and diesel vehicles undermines the "ambition, commitment and consistency" needed by industry from the government. While there was support from organisations representing rural communities for the delay in phasing out oil and gas boilers, citing the impact and cost on rural communities, the CCC looked over the numbers and, while the 2035 date for new fossil fuel boilers was "potentially compatible" with net zero by 2050, the exemption of 20% of households from the phase out will make "Net Zero considerably harder to achieve". They also highlighted the widespread uncertainty this creates for consumers and supply chains. Similarly, the CCC found that pushing back efficiency requirements will cost renters about £325 a year more in bills. It also prolongs the chronic problem of cold, damp, poorly-insulated rental properties – properties that leak energy and can be a health hazard.

In the same speech the prime minister also announced the scrapping of a series of fictional policies — policies which have never been proposed by the Conservative government or the Labour Party. This included a requirement for households to use seven bins, a tax on meat, and compulsory car sharing. It's easy to laugh at the idea of seven bins lined up outside your house on bin day, but it all points to a much deeper problem. A willingness of senior politicians to deliberately use false narratives to win votes and advance their agenda risks turning the environment into a wedge issue between political parties. This undermines public understanding of the issue, but also fractures the cross-party consensus in the UK, which has held fast since the 2008 Climate Change Act. Secondly, it also undermines the authority of independent, expert-led advisory bodies like the Climate Change Committee. It's important that the current government (and the next, whatever its hue) has the courage to have an honest debate about environmental issues, guided by the evidence rather than their political ambitions, and invests in building political consensus around protecting people and the planet. And, it's more important than ever that we pray for politicians and speak up on behalf of creation.

# **OVER THE GARDEN WALL**

... from our neighbours at St Pancras



Dear Friends,

As I write, almost every news bulletin has further devastating reports. Currently, our world has many challenges. However, there is good news, both in Ipswich and worldwide, which is my focus this month.

Together for Ipswich (TFI) partnered with Ipswich in Prayer for a Prayer Breakfast which I was privileged to attend, at the Salvation Army in Woodbridge Road. It was exciting to hear of the increasing lay Christian chaplaincy support in Ipswich schools and colleges. In many years of inspecting post 16 colleges, both the bulk of them and the few that were Catholic, I was able to see the need for, and value of, chaplaincy. Teachers and lecturers often struggle valiantly to support young people and this trained Christian support in many of our schools is a real blessing. Also for those in Years 7-13, Christian Youth Ministries are doing a great job. Three big worship events are already planned for next year and the programme includes summer camps for this age group. Others spoke of support for women and TFI gave an update on their wonderful support for Ukrainians in Ipswich, and for the young men housed in our Novotel. Some have been granted asylum and the others will have moved, mainly to the Midlands and North West, by the time you read this. All our town's Christian volunteers deserve our thanks and need our prayers.

Moving to a worldwide perspective, several weeks ago Pope Francis published *Laudate Deum* (Praise God). He called the climate crisis 'one of the principal challenges facing society and the global community '. He will fly to UAE on 1<sup>st</sup> December to meet world leaders and will attend the climate change conference, COP 28, on 2<sup>nd</sup> December. His earlier encyclical, *Laudato Si'*, published in 2015, was read worldwide by more people than any other papal document. I talked to boys in a Ugandan secondary school about this and on my next visit the school compound was totally changed: the boys had taken up the challenge to care for 'Our common home'! We have seen the effect of climate change in heat waves and floods, and the devastation along our coast. *Laudate Deum* tells us that emissions per individual in the US are about 7 times greater than the average of the poorest countries. The latter suffer most from this, as I know too well from the recent desperate hunger in parts of E Africa which I have visited.

As we approach Advent, let us keep all the many worldwide needs in our prayers, also thanking God for the good work being done in our own town.
