THE MINISTER WRITES ...



²⁷ My sheep hear my voice. I know them, and they follow me. ²⁸ I give them eternal life, and they will never perish. No one will snatch them out of my hand. ²⁹ What my Father has given me is greater than all else, and no one can snatch it out of the Father's hand.³⁰ The Father and I are one.' *John 10:27-30*

Dear All,

In these verses in John's Gospel, we find Jesus saying "*My sheep listen to my voice; I know them, and they follow me.*" For many this is understood in quite a limited, exclusive way, and of course, I respect this approach. But I do think there as a wonderful opportunity to interpret

this verse, not as a narrow condition for belonging, but as a broad and inclusive recognition of all those who respond to divine love in many different forms. This is not to dishonour our own Christian tradition, no way! We thank God for it, we rejoice in it, this is our way of life! This is where we find our amazing God, so awesomely revealed to us in Jesus, our way, our truth, and our life. But at the same time, as those who live in a diverse society, this passage can provoke a reminder that God's love cannot be confined to one denomination, (or two in our case!), or one faith tradition, or one people group. Certainly, from a more theologically liberal perspective, surely, the image of Jesus as the Good Shepherd extends to all who seek compassion, justice, and truth - whether they explicitly follow Jesus or not.

Valuing a more generous, open minded interpretation may be really helpful to us when we are hoping to engage in friendly open-hearted dialogue with people of other faiths, like our Muslim friends. It was so great to meet with our friends at the Ipswich Mosque the other week, we received a very warm welcome, enjoyed an engaging conversion and we are really looking forward to further opportunities to share friendship with them in the coming months. Valuing a more generous, open minded interpretation may be really helpful to us when we are hoping to engage in friendly open-hearted dialogue with those who are sadly on the margins of society: in God's all-encompassing love, we are able to affirm that they too are known and held by God.

Sticking with this theme of God's generous love, perhaps we should also mention Jesus' statement in verse 30, *"The Father and I are one."* Again, this is often interpreted by more conservative Christians as a claim to divine exclusivity. However, we might wonder whether this unity can be understood, not as a boundary-marker, but as a model of divine-human harmony. Rather than using it to claim that only those who believe a specific doctrine are saved, might we see this as a call for all people to live in unity with God's loving and just purposes? Might we see a passage such as this as one which reminds us to challenge religious triumphalism and to promote humility, peacebuilding, and cooperation across lines of belief? Might it be a springboard for ecumenical and interfaith collaboration and a reminder that divine truth often transcends human categories?

Let us pray for the work of Headway, the charity whom we chose at last month's church meeting. They provide support, information and advocacy for people affected by brain injury.


29th June

HEADWAY

Our chosen charity for July – December 2025 is **Headway**, a charity that supports individuals with brain injuries, strokes and neurological conditions. Already we have a good connection with the CEO, Helen Fairweather.



She has given us some introductory leaflets; please take one from the back of the church, to familiarise yourself to what we are raising money for.

Helen is coming to talk to Thursday Forum on 13th November – book the date if you can.

We were also given two free tickets to a very prestigious conference on 21st May which Moira Pinkney and I attended. The keynote speaker was Jonathan Van Tam, Deputy Chief Medical Officer during Covid who spoke about his experiences of leadership and communication skills at that time.

Other talks included one about Epilepsy during pregnancy, FND (Functional Neurological disorder), and one from Laybrook, a specialist bed and chair supplier. A doctor described his experiences of having a stroke himself and the Professor of Rehabilitation from the University of Essex spoke about developments there. Roger Blake spoke about Autism and Tim Lockington spoke about Parkinsons Disease. If you want extra information on any of these, just ask Moira or myself. We may have a leaflet!

Headway's basic service is to people with brain injuries due to brain tumours, accidents, or stroke sufferers, or those suffering from dementia, and they offer a range of therapies and activities based in Ipswich and Bury St Edmunds. However they are also passionate about the causes and exact diagnosis of these injuries, so their remit is wide-ranging.

They are fund-raising for various specific items, like a fleet of wheelchair-accessible vehicles instead of ordinary cars and a minivan. It may be that we will be able to fundraise for something like this?

ECO CHURCH – CREATION CARE

At the Church Meeting on 4th May, Christ Church adopted the following Environmental Policy:

The context

Christ Church recognises the urgency of the climate and nature crises. We believe in our Christian responsibility to care for creation and will take the practical steps necessary to strive towards safeguarding the life of the Earth in our church life and as individuals.

As a member of the Baptist Union and the United Reformed Church, we acknowledge the commitment made by both denominations to achieve Net Zero in our church life, the URC by 2030 and the BU by 2035. In line with these commitments, we will work towards reducing our carbon footprint year on year.

We accept our responsibility to use resources wisely so that climate change is mitigated, biodiversity protected, finite resources conserved and waste and pollution minimised. We will work with the A Rocha Eco-Church programme to guide and develop our practical actions.

Worship and Teaching

Care for creation will be embedded in the life of Christ Church, in our worship, children's work and study. We will communicate our understanding of our responsibility for all that is entrusted to us in creation, making the links between damage to the environment and social and global injustices.

Buildings and Energy

We recognise our most important environmental impact will be an ongoing reduction in our carbon emissions. We will seek to reduce our greenhouse gas emissions, working towards meeting our energy needs from renewable sources and reaching net zero carbon by 2035 at the latest. We will endeavour to make environmentally positive choices in all aspects of our work, including using eco-friendly products, reducing waste, improving energy efficiency, and encouraging environmental awareness among all users of our buildings.

Land and Nature

We commit to an environmentally friendly approach to our church grounds, managing our land as far as is practicable to be kind to nature and encourage bio-diversity.

Community and Global Engagement

We will engage with organisations and with the political process, locally, nationally and globally, in addressing the climate crisis. Recognising the disproportionate impact the changing climate has on the poorest in the world, we will support charities and campaigns which address this injustice.

Lifestyle

We will actively encourage individual members of our congregation to examine their own lifestyle and to take actions in their personal lives, including assessing their own carbon footprint, reducing their use of fossil fuels, considering how they travel and the food choices they make. We will promote re-use, recycling and repair and the avoidance of waste.
